PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

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Dear Parents and Students,

In this issue I will be writing about the California Standards Tests (CSTs) as part of the STAR testing program, the state of our budget and Graduation 2010.

CSTs

We are approaching that time of year where our 9–11 grade students begin preparing for the California Standards Tests, which will be given from April 13–May 3 in their subject area classrooms. We will post the testing schedule on the school website (www.petalumahighschool.org) when it becomes available. We believe that by having the students test in their subject area classes during their regularly scheduled class time they will be more focused and successful since this allows us the ability to provide an environment conducive to greater gains on the test.

These tests are one measure of checking your student's ability in English, math, science, and social studies. The results of these tests are used to see if our students and our school meet the state requirements under the Public Schools Accountability Act of 1999. The California Department of Education uses these scores to assemble the Academic Performance Index, API, and Average Yearly Progress, AYP, reports demonstrating our progress to the federal government. The other test that is used to calculate the API and AYP is the California High School Exit Exam, which students in 10th grade took at the beginning of February—results of this test are not available yet. It is important to note that our students and school are also graded on our student participation rate; in other words, we are graded on how many students actually did take the CAHSEE test in February and will take the CSTs in April. It is important for you to encourage your student to take the CSTs and come to school on time, as the tests count individually as a measure of his/her performance and collectively as our school's performance on these measures.

The Academic Performance Index ranges from 200–1,000. Our school's score on the API is an indicator of how well our students are performing comparatively. We are required to make progress toward the target of 800 every year. Schools that reach the target of 800 must continue to improve or maintain their scores. I am proud to say that our school's summary performance has shown that we gained collectively from a score of 756 in April of 2007 to 786 in April of 2009! This is clearly due to the efforts put forth by our students and teachers who study and work hard to prepare for the academic rigor represented on these tests.

At the same time, we are also measured by how well our students perform in significant specific populations. Here a significant testing population is defined by having 100 or more participants of the same population type with STAR valid scores, or 50 or more participants, comprising at least 15% of the student population, with STAR valid test scores.

Our socio-economic disadvantaged student group increased their scores from 695 to 702 in the 2009 testing period from the prior year. The Hispanic and Latino population decreased from 689 to 677, and our English language learners (a significant testing population since 2005) scored 641 in 2009.

Students with disabilities (a significant testing population since 2006) gained from 534 during 2007-2008 school year to 578 in the 2008-2009 and our white population gained from 795 to 813 over the same time period. While we have made gains across most populations over the years, it is important to note that we still have a gap between populations. Moreover last year the gap between Hispanic / Latino students and other groups widened.

In order to reduce these learning and achievement gaps we are implementing many targeted programs in addition to our core program at Petaluma High School. Two years ago we started a program called Aiming High that targets Algebra 1 instruction to reduce the

learning gap in mathematics for English Language Learners. In this after-school program English Language Learners meet with professionals from the community, who come to PHS to work with them on their Algebra 1 skills. Jim Gueretta, one of our math teachers, oversees the program. As you may or may not know, Algebra 1 is a class that is required for all students to pass in order to help them meet part of their requirements for graduating from high school. If you have a student who is an English Language Learner and they are struggling in Algebra 1 please make arrangements to contact jgueretta@pet.k12.ca.us to enroll your student in this after school program.

Nearly five years ago, we brought in a program called Language! that addresses the needs of students who have difficulty decoding words and reading fluently (phonetics). Since the conception of this program we have been able to reduce the number of sections needed likely due to the success of it. This program has helped many students increase their reading ability and improve from a lower to higher grade level. In addition, teachers offer after-school tutorial programs to address the needs of any struggling students. The math department offers tutoring every Tuesday and Thursday after school. Many teachers are available upon appointment and every teacher is available during tutorial daily. Please encourage your student to participate in tutorial and any of the after-school programs that may apply to his or her needs.

The core and elective academic programs that we offer at PHS are rich and comprehensive and help prepare our students for their future. As you know, we have honors and AP classes in many of the core subject areas and an elective program that spans engineering, business, arts, agriculture, health and human services, languages, and our extraordinary museum, all of which contribute to our students' academic success. The students have gained much knowledge from these programs over time, which is reflected in the level of preparation they have for college and is shown on the results of such testing programs as the CSTs, API and AYP indicators. When you find a moment, we encourage you to talk to your student(s) about the significance of these tests and how they reflect the progress we have made in the programs we offer at our school.

The Budget

This coming year we are facing a budget shortfall district-wide that is approximately \$1.5 million cut continuously over the next three years in addition to the proposed 2.75 % salary cut and/or reduction of 5 student days currently under consideration. The proposed 5 days of reduction are in addition to the 3 staff development days, current furlough days, that were cut in the prior year, for a total of 8 days currently under consideration to help balance the budget.

Moreover, we continue to face a significant decline in enrollment. This decline in enrollment in combination with the budget short fall means we will lose significant funding that pays for many of our programs. We will offer less of our classes and streamline our programs that are already in existence in order to compensate for the decline and shortfall.

Through these difficult times it is important to remember that we are all going through this fiscal crisis together. We should remember the richness of our programs and strength of our faculty that makes us such a unique school. Through our common efforts we will find the means to support all students in classes that we can offer.

Graduation 2010

This year graduation will be on Saturday, June 5, 2010 on Durst field at 10:00 A.M.

This year there was much discussion about changing the date and time of graduation. However since many plans have already been made based on the initial date and time set in the calendar and since there is not enough time to make all of the necessary arrangements the changes will be made next year.

Next year we plan on changing graduation from Saturday to Friday. The time and specific date is still to be determined. Project Graduation will be held on Friday as well, at a location and time to be determined, after the PHS graduation ceremony is completed. We are currently in the process of forming a graduation committee that includes parents, staff and students to discuss our goals and ensure a successful graduation this year and smooth transition next year.

As always are goals are to:

- 1.) Have a respectful graduation ceremony
- 2.) Have appropriate student behavior

We will need your help in talking to your student about maintaining appropriate behavior during and after the ceremony.

Graduation is a celebration of all of the accomplishments your student has made and the parents, guardians and faculty who helped them achieve this defining moment in their lives. We look forward to having a wonderful ceremony this year and years to come!

Santa Rosa Junior College: We have scheduled a meeting on Wednesday, March 3, for all students who may be attending Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) after graduation. The meeting will take place during fifth hour. Mr. Norberto Quiroz of SRJC will discuss specific procedures students will need to follow to enroll in SRJC, register for classes, take placement tests, meet with SRJC counselors, etc.

4-year College Notification: Starting March 1, students who have applied to 4-year colleges will start to receive their notification of acceptance or non-acceptance. This can be an especially stressful time for seniors. In this time of enrollment cutbacks, some students may be disappointed that they were not accepted at their first choice school. It can at times be difficult to understand why a senior was not accepted to a school of their choice. Nevertheless, there is a college or university (perhaps not the first choice) for seniors.

Scholarships continue to be available to seniors and are posted in the career center. Applications for local scholarships are due to Ms Parmer in the career center by March 4.

Please contact your student's counselor by email with any concerns or questions, especially regarding graduation status.

JUNIOR NEWS (11TH Grade)

The path to graduation: Counselors visited English classes in January and reviewed with the students their graduation course requirements as well as college entrance requirements referred to as the "A- G" list. Students also submitted their course requests for their senior year. Counselors will begin meeting individually with each junior student to review their plans for senior year (and beyond) during the months of March and April. We will be reviewing their transcript with them to make sure they are on track for high school graduation and discuss their career and college goals.

Testing: Students who plan to be eligible to go to a four year college need to schedule their ACT or SAT tests for this spring, if possible. Students need to go to actstudent.org to register online for the ACT and to collegeboard.com for the SAT. Tests may be taken in the fall of their senior year, but spring testing is recommended. It gives the student more opportunities to take the tests.

Failing classes: If a student has failed a required course, they will need to repeat it in order to stay eligible to graduate on time. Please contact your counselor to discuss the options.

SRJC Classes: If a student plans on taking a class at SRJC, they can go to www.santarosa.edu to see what classes will be offered for the upcoming semester. They will need to have a signed concurrent enrollment form to sign up for a class.

SOPHOMORE NEWS (10th Grade)

As you probably already know, the counselors have completed the first phase of the scheduling process. All of the course requests have been entered into the computer and the numbers are being analyzed as the next step in preparing the master schedule. Many sophomores have been applying for honors or Advanced Placement (AP) classes. This application process will be completed by early March and students should receive notice of their acceptance into an honors or AP class by the end of March.

On February 2 and 3, the entire sophomore class took the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) in English/language arts and math. Results will not be available for several months. Students who were absent during test days will be given an opportunity March 16-17 for make-up. Hopefully most of our students will pass both of these tests on their first attempt; those who do not pass one or both will have another opportunity to retake the test in November of their junior year. Passing these two tests is required for high school diploma.

Counselors met with all sophomores during the course selection process. At that time we did a transcript review. Please be advised that if your student failed a class required for graduation, he/she must remediate the credit deficiency by taking the class over in their junior or senior year. We do not expect to offer summer school. Students should see their counselor to create a credit remediation plan or to discuss alternative options.

FRESHMAN NEWS, (9th Grade)

Counselors visited all Freshmen English classes to present information regarding classes for next year. Students created 4-year plans following a power point presentation to 9th graders that outlined graduation requirements, college admissions criteria and the wide range of elective options offered at Petaluma High. Parents who would like to review their student's 4-year plan individually with their counselor should contact the Counseling Office at 778-4779 or e-mail the counselor directly for an appointment.

CAREER CENTER

We are constantly getting new information about college opportunities, available scholarships, summer internships, community service volunteering and study abroad programs. Please encourage your student to visit the Career Center to learn what's available to them.

We are hosting speakers from trade and vocational schools, private colleges, the U.S. military, the Upward Bound program at Sonoma State University, and Santa Rosa Junior College's Health Career Institute. We welcome parents who want to share their career fields and knowledge with students, and would like to know if you are interested in speaking with student groups about your areas of expertise.

Save the date.....this year's Senior Recognition Night is scheduled for Wed. evening May 26. Look for more news about this event on the Petaluma High School website and in future parent newsletters.

There are still a few college scholarship opportunities available for students for the 2010-2011 school year so encourage your seniors to ask about them in the Career Center.

Will your student be a senior next year? It's not too early to begin researching the college application process and to make visits to colleges while they are still in session. Many universities break for summer in early May, and while they may have activities on campus during summer months, it will be a different environment than during the regular school year. Excellent information is available online, and a list of useful websites is on the PHS Career Center webpage, www.petalumahighschool.org. You will find links to research specific colleges, detailed information about how to apply for financial aid, and websites for career exploration.

MANUFACTURING TECHNOLOGY

Petaluma High School's Manufacturing Technology program has been awarded NIMS Accreditation. NIMS is The National Institute of Metalworking Skills, a national precision machining industry organization dedicated to preparing entry level workers at the high school, community college and university levels. The following statement was taken from the final audit report, Gail Houser said (on behalf of the evaluation team): "We feel this program is invaluable for the region. It can, in the future, be an anchor for manufacturing education in Northern California."

To date we have issued over 70 NIMS Credentials to PHS students and Petaluma Adult School machinist apprentices. These credentials are earned by students machining a part and having two local shops Quality Assurance Departments inspect and certify them. Once they meet the drawing requirements students take a 90 minute proctored on-line exam to earn up to eight credentials at PHS. The result is a well positioned and qualified employee; one that can pursue a career in the machinist trade or get a good paying (part time) job while studying to be a design or manufacturing engineer. A SPECIAL NOTE ON CAMPUS SECURITY

Daily, adults come on our campus to visit a teacher or counselor. Most often, these are parents who are simply following up on their child’s education, volunteering at an event like Challenge Day, picking up a sick student, or a former student coming by to visit a teacher. We want to clarify the process of visiting our campus and underline the importance of signing in upon arrival. This is for the safety of all our staff and students.

- If you are intending to see your child’s counselor, please call the counseling office to set up an appointment. When you arrive for your appointment at counseling, please sign in and identify yourself at the front desk. After your appointment, please do not enter the rest of the campus. If you are just dropping off a note or paperwork, you may do so without signing in.
- If you are visiting a classroom by appointment, the teacher will have left notice at the front office.

Please sign in and obtain a Visitor Pass. It is likely that you will be asked for identification at this point. Please understand that not everyone will recognize you and we ID for everyone’s safety.

- If you are visiting campus without an appointment, you will be asked to leave a note for the teacher. We cannot interrupt classes for parents or former students who come by to visit. Please use our email system to make prior contact and set up a visit.
- If you are picking up a sick child in the SAC (Student Assistance Center), please sign in and be sure to sign your child out. If you are visiting the SAC for other reasons, you should again sign in and provide identification if requested.
- In general, if our campus security comes across a person without a Visitor Pass who he or she can’t identify, that person will politely be escorted to the office to sign in and get a Visitor Pass if appropriate.

Our overall aim is to keep our campus safe and secure and, at the same time, welcoming to visitors and parents. Thank you for your participation in your child’s education.
